Hotel wants bills paid by lawyers

MILWAUKEE (AP) - Four attorneys who represented defendants in a trial involving a man identified by the FBI as a crime syndicate chieftain have been sued by a hotel for allegedly leaving town without paying their room bills.

The Pfister Hotel says the four attorneys, all from out of state, left bills totaling \$18,985 after the U.S. District Court trial of Frank Balistrieri in 1984.

None of the four attorneys named in the hotel's suit could be reached for comment Friday

They and their bills were identified as Susan Van Deusen of Miami, \$443; Harriet Rosen of New York, \$2,896; Marvin Segal of New York, \$8,645, and Albert Krieger of Miami, \$7,001.

Balistrieri, whom FBI court documents called Milwaukee's crime syndicate boss with ties to Chicago and Las Vegas interests, is serving a 13year federal prison sentence.

He and his sons, Frank and Joseph, both attorneys, were convicted of trying to extort a man who set up a vending-machine business in Balistrieri territory. They were unaware he was an FBI undercover agent.

The Balistrieri sons are appealing the convictions that led to eight-year

prison sentences.

The three are among several men facing trial Sept. 9 in Kansas City on government charges that almost \$2 million was skimmed from Las Vegas casino profits.

RICO THE ENFORCER


J. Ray McDermott & Co., a major builder of oil platforms, paid \$508,615 in bribes to the vice chairman of Tenneco Oil Co. to undertake lucrative construction projects in the Gulf of Mexico. But the cost of doing business jumped unexpectedly last year after the firm pleaded guilty on seven criminal counts. A Federal judge in New Orleans not only fined McDermott \$103,000, but confiscated its \$897,000 in illegal profits from the Tenneco deals.

While serving as mayor of Lansing, Ill., for sixteen years, Jack O. McNary shook down real-estate developers and invested his booty in two private businesses. Convicted last year of extortion, McNary was senpit as underworld hit men. While Justice officials concede the law must be applied cautiously, they see no need to sheath their weapon. "This is a valuable tool," says. Attorney General-designate Benjamin Civiletti. "We will not shy away from using it to pursue corrupt enterprises which do not fit the layman's view of organized crime." With about 200 RICO cases already filed, and the government increasing its use of the statute, the American Bar Association has scheduled a special seminar on how to


deal with RICO at its convention this week.

RICO is one of the broadest criminal statutes Congress has ever passed. The law first enumerates 24 Federal and eight led seven nursing-home owners and three pharmacists to plead guilty and pay fines of \$1 million.

The law also gives prosecutors extraordinary latitude to trace crime back to the otherwise insulated kingpin. "The statute allows a prosecutor to paint a broader picture than could be normally seen by a jury," says Jeremiah T. O'Sullivan, chief of the Organized Crime Strike Force in Boston. For instance, John Christopher was tried in Tampa, Fla., in 1975 for masterminding a ring that kidnapped women and forced them into prostitution. Normally, the scope of the evidence would have been limited to the specific kidnapping; at the RICO trial, however, the judge permitted







tenced to three years in prison. He will also have to ransom his businesses, which the government now effectively controls.

These cases share a dubious distinction. The Justice Department prosecuted them—and other button-down crimes-with a law designed specifically to convict Mafia capos. Known as RICO (Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations), the nine-yearold law allows the government to seize legitimate businesses if they have been used for illegal schemes or as investments for dirty money. Says Chicago attorney Sherman Magidson, "RICO can reach out and castrate people."

The RICO law frightens many lawyers and judges. They worry about language so loosely drawn that it lets the government sweep even small-time white-collar destate crimes such as murder, extortion or mail fraud; then it states that anyone found to have participated in two of them within a ten-year period has undertaken a pattern of racketeering. If prosecutors can link such patterns to an interstate "enterprise"-loosely defined as virtually any personal association or business-the defendants become subject to imprisonment for up to twenty years, fines of \$25,000 per count and forfeiture. "Taking away businesses from these guys is like taking away tools from a burglar," says New Jersey Federal prosecutor George Wilson.

RICO is an extremely potent weapon for prosecutors. In plea bargaining, when most cases are settled, the potential RICO penalties often lead defendants to make a deal with the government rather than take their chances with a jury. In Chicago, for in50 witnesses to describe Christopher's criminal behavior over thirteen years.

The government has used RICO in several important prosecutions against reputed mobsters. In Chicago, two alleged organized-crime hit men were sent to prison for 30 years after RICO convictions. And in Boston, after convicting four extortionists, the government seized the contents of five massage parlors-including 5 gallons of massage lotion and a Christmas tree.

VICTORY: Much of the controversy about RICO has focused on white-collar and government corruption cases. Federal officials won an important victory last month when the U.S. appeals court in New York upheld a guilty verdict in a complicated RICO hospital-fraud prosecution. Prosecutors established that Karl R. Huber, a Phi Beta Kappa Princeton graduate and

The matter under consideration began when Leo E. Wanta, designating himself as "stipulated petitioner for Falls Vending Service, Inc.," filed various motions challenging actions taken by the United States Bankruptcy Court for this district in a case entitled In Re: Falls Vending Service, Inc., Debtor (Case No. 83-02385). Wanta's motions are resisted by the Parmers and Merchants Bank of Menomonee Falls, a secured creditor in the bankruptcy action. Magistrate Robert L. Bittner, efter a thorough examination of the matter, has recommended dismissing the action because Wanta lacks standing and also has failed to properly invoke this court's jurisdiction. I concur in the magistrate's analysis and adopt his recommendation in full.

In his written objections, Wanta contends that the magistrate's analysis of his standing is faulty because Falls Vending Service is not a legal and valid corporation, and therefore, cases holding that a corporation can only be represented by

licensed counsel do not apply to this matter. Even if Palls Vending Service is not a corporation, Wanta lacks standing because his affidavit testimony indicates he is only an employee of the company. The owner of a company cannot confer standing on a non-lawyer employee by stipulation or otherwise.

Wanta's objections do not address his failure to properly invoke this court's jurisdiction. No complaint has been filed. Wanta failed to follow the proper procedures to perfect an appeal pursuant to Part 8, Rule 8001 et seq. of the United States Bankruptcy Rules. The matter must be dismissed sua sponte for lack of jurisdiction.

THEREFORE IT IS ORDERED that the action is hereby dismissed.





Dear Jim,

I just received word from the Dane County Jail that Leo was this morning transferred to Mendota State Mental Institute. I spoke with Wendy Hegge, the Patient Rights Facilitator at Mendota who told me that if the court order stated that Leo could be drugged, that the doctors could begin to administer the drugs immediately. I also just spoke with an inmate in another institution who told me that from his knowledge, it was likely that the doctors would immediately begin to administer Thorazine.

Leo has such a profound objection to drugs that I'm afraid he'll lose control when they start to inject him. Leo is well aware of what the drugs can do to his "memory bank".

I have contacted Professor Szasz' office in Syracuse and am waiting for him to return my call.

What action can we take that will most expeditiously stop the drugging? Greg has a draft of a motion to restrain the drugging.

I look forward to seeing you tomorrow in Madison. I am prepared to pay you your initial retainer fee.

It might be possible to visit Leo tomorrow evening after 6 P.M.. I will attempt to visit him and would welcome your coming with.

I'll phone you later either at the office or at home.

I assume you got my email on this subject – but where you are concerned, nothing is a safe assumption (so I'll repeat some of it).

Read the directions on each can... cooking with freeze-dried is different than cooking with dehydrated or frozen or canned food.

To make vegetable beef soup that will last two or three days:

1. Bring four cups of water to a boil and turn off the burner. Pour the desired amount of ground beef (a couple of handsful), a handful of onions, potatoes, carrots, beans, peas and let sit for ten minutes. Add tomato powder to taste (you'll have to add more water... it's kind of a "feel your way" process. Add a beef bullion cube and allow to melt... then add water to taste and bring to a slow boil over a medium heat.

To make chicken noodle soup (get noodles from store):

Bring four cups of water to a boil and turn off the burner. Pour the desired amount of chicken (a couple of handsful), a chicken bullion cube, onions and celery to taste, and let sit for ten minutes. Add water to taste.

You can do the same with lentils and ham.

You can eat this food directly out of the can (meat included, it's cooked). Freeze-dried food should be rehydrated, but with this food it isn't absolutely necessary. If you don't have access to water, you can eat the veggies, meat and fruit (I didn't send fruit — it is absolutely delicious, though) right out of the can. It actually tastes good out of the can, so you won't starve.

I should have copies of the Mississippi and California court transcripts by Monday. If I get time, I'll scan them and send. I've stopped writing on the book – with no word from you on the chapters sent relative to approval or disapproval, like/dislike, and no response re edits for Chapter 5, I can only assume it is not at the top of your priority list. I did get the edits through Chapter 4... at the end of 4, "finis." I am writing letters to various people. I'll enclose the two I've completed to give you an idea of what I'm doing. If I get a response from them, fine... if I do not, that's fine, too. I can write about either, equally. I'm not mailing anything until I've been through all of the notebooks I've created from each of the five counties and have written all of the letters having to do with the pre-May 1995 trial. Then I'll mail them all at the same time. We'll see. Then I'll begin writing letters to Dane County re the trial. It dawned on me that when something is this complex, this deeply embedded in details, it's best to approach it one violation at a time.

I may write about nothing for awhile. I've been pretty sick and my energy is pretty limited so I'm not doing a lot. Dizziness with the headaches has put me in bed.
